A Message from our Chairman

Despite profound disruption to every aspect of its operations, the last 12 months have seen the Children's Cancer Foundation make enormous progress in its mission to save and improve the lives of children with cancer.

The Foundation is delighted to announce the formation of the Victorian Paediatric Cancer Consortium, a ground-breaking collaboration which includes the Monash Children's Hospital, Monash University, The Hudson Institute of Medical Research, Royal Children's Hospital, University of Melbourne, the Murdoch Children's Research Institute, Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre and the Walter & Eliza Hall Institute. The Foundation has procured a \$9.6m grant from the Commonwealth to kickstart this initiative, which represents a pathway to collaborative excellence for research and clinical care of global significance.

The Consortium will be leveraged by another of the Foundation's seminal initiatives. In 2019, the Foundation announced the establishment of the Children's Cancer Foundation Chair at Melbourne University. A global search is underway for an eminent clinician/researcher to occupy that position, with an appointment expected in early 2022. And in the last year our close friends at My Room Children's Cancer Charity have committed to co-fund this initiative with the Foundation to the tune of \$3 million.

That said, the inescapable fact is that the Foundation's revenue during the pandemic has been seriously impaired. At the same time, the demands on the Foundation from families, the children's hospitals and the research community have continued unabated.

However, the directors are proud to advise that the Foundation has honoured and will honour every project commitment during the pandemic and will do likewise in 2022.

We have been able to this in a large part due to the generosity of our supporters over so many years, particularly those who attend and donate to The Million Dollar Lunch. The cancellation of this event in 2020 and 2021 has caused enormous difficulties. But in each of those years our small team has pulled together an online Giving Day which in 2021 raised \$771,320.

It has been extremely moving to observe the generosity of our community expressed through the Giving Day. Not only has it given us a critical boost to our coffers, it has elevated the morale of the Foundation at a time when most charities are in at least some distress.

Likewise, we are grateful to those who have supported us through smaller fundraising initiatives several of which are highlighted in this review. And a special acknowledgement to those whose bequests will be honoured through the work of the Foundation.

With such magnificent support, the Foundation is well placed to fund its future commitments of \$11,515,467 out to 2024.

A special word of thanks to the Cornerstone Partners of The Million Dollar Lunch, Crown Resorts, The Australian Football League, Sportsbet, Virgin Australia and Lexus of Blackburn, as well as The Million Dollar Lunch Committee.

A Message from Tracey

We have remained focused throughout the pandemic, on funding ground-breaking initiatives aimed at 'moving the needle'...

Covid-19 has changed the way we live our lives – we have experienced lockdowns, home schooling, working-from-home, closed businesses, mask wearing, and limitations on our movement.

As many people struggled with the impact of health directives on their physical, social, mental and financial well-being, some families also faced the cruel reality of their child being diagnosed with cancer.

As the media reported daily Covid-19 case numbers and mortalities, what was not reported was that over 1000 children in Australia were diagnosed with cancer in the past year. Many more were on active treatment, or living with the late effects of survivorship.

And every week of the pandemic 3 children died from cancer.

The speed at which effective Covid-19 vaccines were developed represents a triumph of science and medicine. A demonstration of what can be achieved when urgency, deep resources, and brilliant minds collide.

I cannot help but wonder what might be accomplished if the same variables were to intersect for childhood cancer – we already have the motivation and brilliant minds.

Project Highlight

Children's Cancer Foundation and My Room Chair in Childhood Cancer

After being constrained by the global preoccupation with Covid-19 and the resultant impacts the parties to this exciting initiative regrouped in mid 2021 to set a course for realising the aspiration of this initiative.

The Children's Cancer Foundation and My Room Chair in Childhood Cancer will play a significant role in eliminating children's cancer on a national and international scale, by ensuring new research outcomes are translated into patient treatments.

This exclusive, Australian-first position will bring the advances and expertise in adult cancer and new genomic innovations to the field of childhood cancer for the next decade and beyond.

This investment of \$12,000,000, will provide a lifetime of hope for Australian Children. The investment is funded by the Children's Cancer Foundation (\$3,000,000), My Room Children's Cancer Charity (\$3,000,000) to be matched by the participating learning, clinical and research partners identified below. This is to create a perpetual position that will be unrivalled in its dedicated focus to advancing childhood cancer research and clinical treatment until it is eradicated.

Together with the Children's Cancer Foundation and My Room, the Chair will:

- provide academic leadership as a professor at the University of Melbourne

The Victoria Paediatric Cancer Consortium (VPCC)

The Children's Cancer Foundation Vision for Building Critical Mass and Collaboration in Children's Cancer Research in Victoria

The Foundation is seeking to catalyse a new approach to childhood cancer research in Victoria. Our belief is that Victoria, with a population of over 6.6 million and birth-rate in excess of 80,000 per annum merits a holistic vision for childhood cancer research and care.

The current state of Victoria's children's cancer research is not optimal with the level of research being too low and the activities not always aligned. The pathways for the next generation of brilliant minds also needs support. We believe it can be better.

The Foundation's vision for Victoria is to create an integrated and collaborative children's cancer research consortium within Victoria that has critical mass and will act as a focus for national and international collaborations. The goal being to ensure research-informed, evidenced-based continuous improvement in care of paediatric patients and their families in Victoria.

This consortium would become a focus for education, research and clinical care and a magnet for the brightest minds in Australia and internationally.

In 2021 the Foundation obtained support from the Federal Government for this initiative. A grant was announced by the Federal Minister for Health utilising the resources of the Medical Research Futures Fund (MRFF) Emerging Priorities and Consumer Driven Research Initiative. This grant allocated \$9.6 million to a scope of work, across multiple institutions, which we hope will be the catalyst for the formation of an ongoing Victorian Paediatric Cancer Consortium (VPCC).

The initial program of work for the VPCC from 1 July 2021 to 30 June 2024 includes the following elements

Discovery Research Programs:

- Theme 1: Next Generation Precision Oncology (Flagship Program)
- Theme 2: Tumour Microenvironment (TME) & Immunotherapy
- Theme 3: Epigenomics & Differentiation Therapy

Clinical Innovation Programs:

- Theme 1: Pharmaco- and radio-genomics (Flagship Program)
- Theme 2: Patient Survivorship
- Theme 3: Risk Stratification Sarcoma

Theses areas of focus were determined based on

- areas of urgent need in paediatric cancer;
- greatest innovation and international impact;
- sustainability and potential to attract future investment;
- feasibility of clinical translation; and
- ability to leverage existing and complementary strengths at partner Institutes to achieve greatest impact.

This work was determined after actively engaged with other national research activities to avoid any duplication and ensure these bodies of work were complementary. It is hoped that this initial scope of work and collaboration will create on going momentum and resources for paediatric research in Victoria.

The Million Dollar Lunch Giving Day

Another year of amazing virtual initiative for children with cancer

"Surviving Cancer is not enough. Our children need to thrive".

The Foundation, like many of us, has learnt to be nimble in a pandemic environment. Moving from a fully sold out physical Million Dollar Luncheon to a reschedule date, a cancellation, and finally a virtual giving day.

Through the year, we had done our share of moaning about the difficulties, inconveniences and frustrations. But was just as quick to remember the children and families we serve and the lost children we honour.

We had to just get on with it, and so we did on 7th October 2021. Where in just over 12 hours we raised \$771,320.

Our support came from many quarters - many of those planning to attend the Million Dollar Lunch kindly donated their table purchase price, corporate partners dealing with their own challenges did what they could, past attendees, regular donors, friends, family, parents and children from all walks of life. Some were touched by cancer but many were not.

We extend the biggest thanks to each and everyone who generously donated to the Giving Day to assist children with cancer.

Our Virtual Giving Day hero Stella bravely shared the story of her battle with cancer and the legacy challenges she and her family now face.

Her story shed some light on the need for more research on the unacceptable side effects of being treated for childhood cancer. It reminds us of the devastating facts:

- Around 1,000 children and adolescents will be diagnosed with cancer in Australia;
- 150 of these will not survive their cancer
- Of the 850 survivors over 550 will have some form of long term health issues from their treatment.

Stella's story reminds us of the need to focus our research efforts on not just improving survival but on:

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- identifying individual children's predisposition to longer term issues and utilising "less likely" alternative treatments; and
- identification of kinder treatments.

The Foundation has recently been successful in securing some Federal government funding to assist in research to better understand the unacceptable toxicities of the existing treatments but much more needs to be done.

A Beautiful Memory of Zoe

Zoe's mother Edwina bravely shared her harrowing recent experience as a reminder that much more work needs to be done and to raise fund to clinical research and clinical care for children affected by cancer

"Last year, my daughter Zoe was born with an extremely rare and aggressive form of cancer called Alveolar Rhabdomyosarcoma (RMS). Through her treatments I learnt that although there are around 12 drugs released to treat adult cancer every year, only 8 drugs have been approved to treat childhood cancer since 1978. None of these drugs are targeted for RMS, with this type of cancer often referred to as one of the 'forgotten cancers'. With our limited treatment options, we did everything we could. She went through a leg amputation, chemotherapy and we were preparing to start radiation. Despite her treatment, the cancer spread to her brain and she passed away in January this year, leaving us absolutely heartbroken. We need to support more research into new treatment options for rare childhood cancers."




